SYDNEY FOR EVERYONE

Start at The Rocks

The Rocks is the oldest part of Sydney. Historically, it is an area of great importance as it is here that Sydney was founded, when the first British convicts were sent here in 1788. Because of its architecture from colonial times, it is often called Sydney's 'outdoor museum'. But today The Rocks has trendy boutiques, souvenir shops, cafés, restaurants and a weekend street market. The Sydney Visitor Centre is here too, so it's a good place to start your visit. **Open** from 9.30 am to 5.30 pm daily.



Climb Sydney Harbour Bridge

This is one of Sydney's most popular tourist attractions, called the 'Coat Hanger' by local people. It's easy to see why. Don't miss the challenge¹ of the Bridge Climb for an unforgettable experience!

The building of the bridge took about eight years. It was opened in 1932 and is used by about 150,000 vehicles daily. It takes about 80,000 litres of paint to paint the bridge once, and painting never stops. Did you know that the movie star Paul Hogan, better known as 'Crocodile Dundee', used to be a bridge painter before he became famous?

Opening times: 7 am to 8 pm daily.




Visit Sydney's historic buildings

Visit Elizabeth Farm in Parramatta, the oldest European building in Australia. Begun in 1793, the farm was the home of John and Elizabeth Macarthur, settlers² from England who became sheep farmers and started Australia's wool export industry. The old house, its furniture and its gardens show visitors how they used to live in the early 19th century. **Open** 9.30 am to 4 pm Friday to Sunday.

See a world-famous Sydney sight

The spectacular Sydney Opera House is situated in Sydney Harbour, surrounded by water on three sides. It was built by a Danish architect and was completed in 1973. Its design is a masterpiece of twentieth century architecture and a world-famous sight. By the way, not only opera but also concerts, theatre and ballet are performed here. If you take the 2-hour backstage tour, you can stand on the stage, where stars like Pavarotti or Michael Bubl  have sung.



Visit Sydney Aquarium

Sydney Aquarium is one of the biggest in the world, with at least 6,000 fish, mostly Australian, and 650 different kinds of fish and marine animals. Visitors walk through underwater viewing tunnels to see marine life close up. Don't miss looking a huge shark³ in the eye! **Opening times:** 9 am to 10 pm daily.
